

## The Archives Catalog of The Strong

The Archives Catalog of The Strong contains detailed descriptive information about the Archival Collections housed in the Brian Sutton-Smith Library and Archives of Play. The descriptive information is organized into a document called a **Finding Aid**. A Finding Aid is written by archivists and describes the history of a collection and the arrangement of materials to help a user navigate the contents of the collection and identify materials relevant to their research. 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## Collection Inventory

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### Series I: Personal, 1941-2014

#### Series Scope and Content Note

This series documents the personal life and interests of Steven Epstein. It includes newspaper articles about Epstein's involvement with the ARKS Foundation [a not-for-profit to support recovery from Anorexia Nervosa] and an article in *GQ Magazine* about Epstein. The series also includes reference articles that discuss general pinball, Steve Kordek, a fictional short story about a pinball player, and "Profits ...in Pennies: Your Guide to Success in Modern Arcade and Sportland Operation" from 1941.

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**Inventory** – Provides an outline that identifies the Series, Boxes, Folders, and in some cases items within the collection. The Inventory section also provides more in-depth information to each Series or Subseries.

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Of note are two proposals by Epstein for "Arcadia 21" and "The Great American Amusement Emporium." "Arcadia 21" and "The Great American Amusement Emporium" were proposals for two different family fun complexes that included an arcade or pinball component, cineplexes, restaurants, and other activities.

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### Series II: Broadway Arcade, 1980-2014

#### Series Scope and Content Note

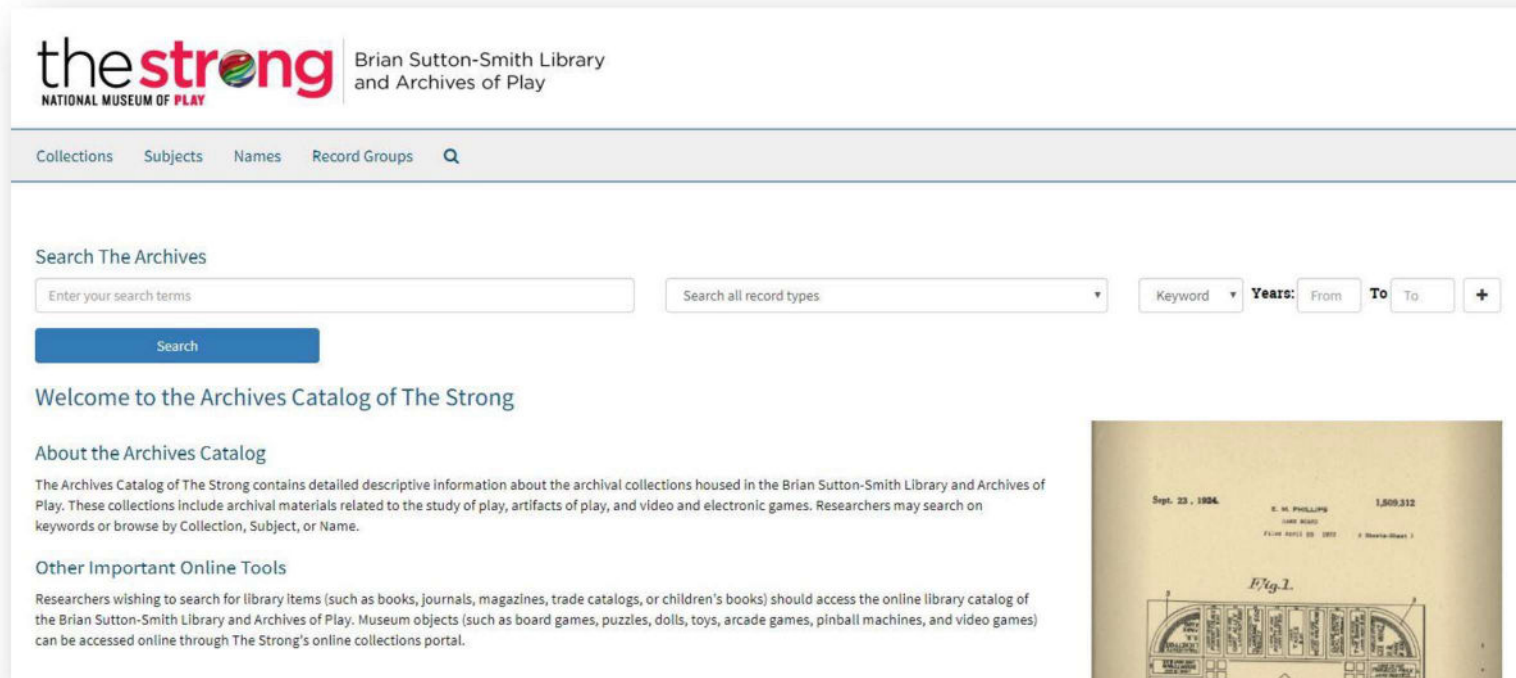
This series documents Epstein's role in turning the Broadway Arcade into the "Pinball Capital of the World." The materials consist of newspaper clippings about the arcade, correspondence, promotional materials, photographs, and VHS cassettes.

Of note is the ad copy for the *Village Voice*. Epstein mentioned in an interview that advertising in the *Village Voice* was a turning point for the arcade.

Many of the VHS cassettes in this series contain promotional slides and bill call used to promote the Broadway

**Scope and Content Note** This series contains Instructions for games published between 1893 and 1952, with the bulk of the games from the 1920s through the 1940s. They have been arranged in alphabetical order, and when possible, dates have been identified based on the copyright date of the instructions. Parker Brothers manufactured the majority of these games, though products from several other companies appear. Some of the instructions have minor notations in Howard's handwriting.

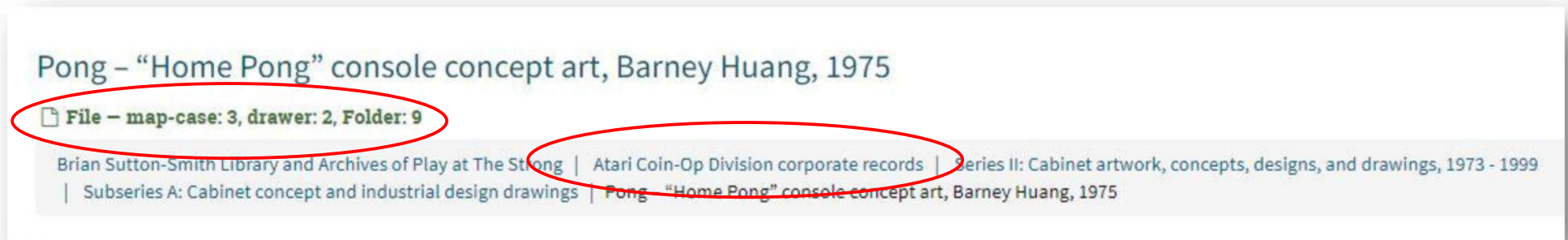

These materials demonstrate the evolution of the process of creating sell sheets, including copy, mockup, and final film proof. Also included are published, final sell sheets. These sell sheets were used to market Atari games in print advertisements, as well as at trade shows. (Folder titles followed by an asterisk indicate that damaged materials have been photographed and discarded; digital images exist.)

The next page will give you specific details about the component, such as which Collection the file/component is from, along with its physical location.

Abstract The 1UP collection of electronic gaming media coverage is a combination of VHS cassettes, Beta cassettes, a CD-ROM, and a DVM cassette containing recorded news stories, recordings of G4 Television, and various live recordings of festivals and conventions, all of which relate to video games of the late 1990s and early 2000s.

- A Visit from St. Nicholas manuscript**  
Item – item: manuscript Identifier: 77.807  
Abstract The Strong Museum has one of only four known original signed manuscripts of the famous poem, "A Visit from St. Nicholas," better known as "'Twas the Night Before Christmas." Although sometimes disputed, New York scholar Clement Clark Moore (1799-1863) allegedly wrote the poem in 1822. Published anonymously in a Troy, New York newspaper in 1823, the poem became an instant success. This copy is signed by Moore, dated August 1853, and reads at the bottom "Written many years ago; I cannot say..."

Abstract These materials, collected by AGPI, include two typed manuscripts from Norman Hasselriis on the history of card games. The manuscripts, titled "An Invitation to a Whist Party" and "A Short Whistory of Bridge," each have an annotation reading "from his unpublished book."

Abstract These materials, collected by AGPI, include two manuscripts from Sally Sugarman: "Children's Games as Cultural Commentary" (paper presented at Popular Culture Conference, Toronto, Canada, March 8, 1990) and "Children on Board: Images from Candy Lands" (noted as "forthcoming in a Popular Culture book Images of Childhood").


